Céline Papin	 The City of Bordeaux is committed to two main areas in its international roadmap. Bordeaux has long-standing and rich links with Africa, and it is essential to cross the perspectives between our territory and the African continent. Biodiversity is a key issue, both locally and internationally, particularly in Africa and South America. Concrete actions taken: Through Climate Chance, exchanges are organised to put into practice actions in favour of the climate and biodiversity. The city is focusing on issues such as ecological continuity, the management of green spaces, and the role of the agricultural sector in these transitions. Local and regional authorities have a crucial role to play. Significant concern about the financing of biodiversity-related projects, in particular the prospects offered by biodiversity credits. She welcomes the presence of Cités Unies France (CUF), demonstrating a collective desire to influence and transform territories in order to preserve the living world.

Climate Chance firmly believes that local authorities are key to meeting the world's climate commitments. Biodiversity is often less talked about, but these issues are just as crucial as climate change, and they need to be integrated into a common agenda. In the organisation of Climate Chance, it is important not to centralise everything in Paris, as is often the case in the world of conservation. This relocated event demonstrates the commitment of local authorities This is the first time that the issue of biodiversity has been officially put on the table by local and regional authorities, which makes CUF's presence all the more significant. It is essential to seize the new opportunities offered by biodiversity credits, in addition to carbon credits, in order to ensure the consistency of both quantitative and qualitative objectives across all territories.
